Pupil Premium is additional funding the school receives. It is used to promote and enhance the opportunities of those children who are looked after, children from lower income families and children with one or more parents in the armed forces. Schools can choose to spend this money in one of three ways:

- 1. For the purposes of the school, i.e. for the educational benefit of pupils registered at that school.
- 2. For the benefit of pupils registered at other maintained schools or academies.
- 3. On community facilities, e.g. services whose provision furthers any charitable purpose for the benefit of pupils at the school or their families, or people who live or work in the locality in which the school is situated.

In addition, the grant does not have to be completely spent by schools in the financial year; some or all of it may be carried forward to future financial years.

2017-2018 Funding Allocation


At the beginning of the academic year, two children attending the school were eligible for Pupil Premium funding. The amount received during the academic year 2017-2018 was £2.640.

<u>2017-2018 Funding Spend</u>

Over the academic year, Pupil Premium funding has been used to part-fund additional hours of a teaching assistant in Key Stage 2. This allowed the school to provide additional information and support for all any child making slow progress or working below agerelated expectations.

Impact of the Pupil Premium spend

The table below shows the progress children eligible for Pupil Premium funding made in Reading, Writing and Maths, and compares this with expected progress and the progress made by children not eligible for Pupil Premium funding.



Conclusion

The children who were eligible for Pupil Premium funding in the academic year 2017-2018 made better than expected progress in all areas. These children also made better progress than their peers in Writing and Maths, and progress in line with their peers in Reading.

Pupil Premium Funding 2018-2019

The estimated amount of additional funding to be received during the academic year 2018-2019 is £4,560. This funding is planned to be spent on:

- investing in iPad-based technologies to enhance children's understanding of letter patterns, basic number facts and early coding skills;
- subscribing to online learning platforms to promote the rapid recall of multiplication and division facts;
- part-funding a teaching assistant in order to provide 1:1 and small group intervention at the point of need.
